
Monsters, Dir. Mia Fryer 3'(UK)


Abstrata, Dir. Juliana Andrade Venturini 2' (UK)


ISLA, Dir. Beatriz Antunes, Jack Williamn 2' (UK)

Marvelous Gift, Dir. Danna Galeano, German Acuña 5' (Colombia)

In a world where humanity has gained the gift of eternal life, 'Marvelous Gift' invites you on a journey where fatal accidents aren't fatal and aging never ceases. Dive into the paradox of immortality and explore the raw reality of life when the end is taken off the table.



When a mysterious moving light dashes by, a curious little star secretly leaves the comfort of his sheltering mother to investigate, alone. By venturing deep into the universe and far from what he knows, he is faced with overwhelming new experiences that he must navigate without the guidance of his mother.



Cosmic Bodies, Submitter Kaavya 2' (UK)

In response to overwhelmingly dystopian cyberpunk media, this project aims to envision a queer utopia, incorporating imagery inspired by South Asian mythology and post-human bodies in contemporary science fiction. The film combines Risograph printed frames and digital 2D animation to depict a queer post-human world and the creatures that inhabit it.




**GOODBYE FOREVER MAYBE?,** Dir. Karoline Björk, Sammy Paul 14' (UK)

## 8pm - Sound and Vision

"Don't you wonder sometimes about sound and vision?" sang David Bowie. Yes we do Bowie!
This collection showcases films that showcase a strong relationship between audio and visuals - whether it be music video, choreography, abstract visuals or more humour based pieces. Don't expect a beginning, a middle and an end with these films, this is more of a wild ride of styles and form from figurative character based animation through to non narrative abstract.



(D)Infinity, Dir. Taewan Kim 4' (UK)

(D)Infinity is a Sci-Fi animation exhibiting chaos and beauty in outer space. Using only graphite and paper the film renders the artist's own interpretations of dimensional infinity. The universe consists from harmony and balance of the four fundamental forces of nature: Strong force, weak force, gravity, electro-magnetism.

**Shapes,** Dir. Tsz-wing Ho 5'4' (Hong Kong)

A psychedelic and mysterious galaxy composed of different shapes. They conduct various transformations with textures, patterns and colors.

Fusion, Dir. Richard R. Reeves 3" (Canada)

Investigating interplay between sound and picture as visual music. An experimental animation experience produced by drawing both sound and picture onto 35mm film. A film without words. No camera or musical instrument was used.

New Water Musi, Dir. Dan Rule '(USA)

In New Water Music a cast of strange plants and flowers play, help and devour each other over an original music composition by Yotam Haber

Rise Age, Dir. Tatjana Theuer 5' (Germany)

Fluorescent critter groove through a coastal world, led by a superior chorus. Their carefree crawl, however, is increasingly interrupted by the rising seas. As the water works its magic on the beaches, one by one they are swept away. But is an invisible danger worth slowing down the usual crawling routine? A rhythmic poem of cute creatures, peer pressure and the urge to move to higher ground in time.

The Wild-Tempered Clavie, Dir. Anna Samo 7' (USA)

An artist insists on playing despite the world's disasters. A story told through a filmmaker's art, inspired by Bach's timeless music and painted on rolls of toilet paper in an homage to the tradition of drawing directly on 35 mm film.

Intermezzos, Submitter Putik Amirasari 3' (Indonesia)

Intermezzo is a performance-driven story about a character who is trapped in her own idea of perfection. The film acts as some kind of metaphorical self-reflection piece of the character, who sees perfection as a form of comfort, even though chaos lies within it.

#### 8pm - Sound and Vision



Miramis, Dir. Angie Siveria, Oskar Schuster 3' (Germany)

Angie Siveria's poem is a reflection on the ongoing war in Ukraine, her childhood in Donetsk, which is now temporarily occupied. This poetry film is about how people want to save their childhood and everything/ everyone connected with it, take it with them to a safe place. The animated video was created as the official music video for Oskar Schuster's piece "Miramis".



A Year of Hands, Dir. Cally Trench 1' (UK)

366 hours in one minute. 'A Year of Hands' is made up of 366 drawings of my hands in ink on watercolour paper, drawn every day for one hour, life-size, from life, using both hands, from 5th August 2023 to 4th August 2024. I chose the position of my hands each day to depict a series of commonplace movements. The sound, which I created from instruments, toys and vocalisations, echoes the stroking and tapping movements of my hands.



Green Lung, Dir. Simon Hamlyn 3' (UK)

In the cradle of the Industrial Revolution, workers turn towards nature to heal from the conditions of the mill. A hand-printed film about Britain's first public park.



In Threes, Dir.Natalia Ryss 7' (UK)

The image-idea of the Tree as an embodiment of the Three Principles unites the manifestations of forms, following the rhythm of the heart..



**Bob Dylan's Big Dick,** Dir. Chris Lambourne 3' (UK)

Music video for Frank & Beans' song 'Bob Dylan's Big Dick' A man goes for a drink, but is stalked by the manifestation of his grotesque masculinity.




Imagine the Audience Naked Dir. Reuben Underwood1'(UK)

'Imagine the Audience Naked' is a mixed media animation that follows funk band Grog Machine as they walk out into the spotlight. They may have only just switched on their amps and kicked on their guitar pedals but something is definitely wrong.

Following a dramatically visceral script and drawing visual inspiration from 90s anime classics, we had all the tools we needed to create this 3 minute music video. Premiering at Adult Swim's music festival this summer with DeathByRomy in attendance, the 'Late Nights' music video has achieved 45k views on Adult Swim's Youtube channel.




Milimo, Dir. Kemane Bâ 3' (Congo)

In an attempt to cross the Mediterranean Sea for a better future, the tragic fate of the young Ahmadou is sealed. The story is a cautionary tale, journeying through the vast cosmos of West African lore, Incorporating some of the most ancient stories that have been told since the dawn of human existence.




where blue meets red, Dir. Tamás Patrovits 4'30 (Hungary)

The film consisting of several dozens of original risograph prints, is an under-the-camera, straight-ahead animation improvised to the rhythm of the scores of Hungarian Barabás Lőrinc jazz trumpeter and composer.



A reel of Super 8 Kodachrome film shot in Brighton at a fairground in the 1990s, was processed and several years later coloured ink was added to the footage. This was then put to one side and partially forgotten until being finally returned to in 2024, more than two decades after the original filming. Simple colour inversions were applied to enhance the image quality, and a soundtrack was composed of electronic sounds made with Hellitron tone generators.



electron city II, Dir. Stuart Pound 4'(UK)

I've captured an AI image from the internet, of a woman walking down a street in Tokyo. One of the filters used simulates punched holes in a strip of film and brings together analogue, digital and Al. A second filter brings out the sense in the original, of night in a brightly lit and rainy street.


**Pear Garden,** Dir. Shadab Shayegan 7' (Germany)

Six years old Lily visits her grandmother after grandma had a mastectomy and doesn't have breasts anymore. At night, Lily finds out that the shadow of grandma has the breasts, Lily follows her and tries to get the breasts back for her grandma.



**And Granny Would Dance,** Dir. Maryam Mohajer 10'(UK)

Marmar listens to the stories told by her grandmother's friends as they play an illicit game of cards. Based on childhood memories and shared stories, And Granny would dance is a tale of love, grief and resilience. At its heart, it is a tribute to the solidarity of Iranian women.



A young woman struggling with Borderline Personality Disorder goes about her day until something goes terribly wrong.



The Eating of an Orange, Dir. May Kindred-Boothby 7' (UK)

Stark conformity dominates the residents of a large manor house. Identical figures eat the same, move the same, look the same. But everything changes when one woman gets given an orange by a strange figure. She has never seen an orange.



The Gardener, Dir. Efa Blosse-Mason, Sofie Marsh 2'(UK)

The Gardener, based on a poem from Jane Campbell's prize-winning debut collection features exquisite stop-motion animation by director artists Efa Blosse Mason and Sophie Marsh. The gardener narrator prepares for a joyful 'after-death' as she becomes part of the the orchard she planted.



**Loop Line, Dir. Renuka Shahane 8' (India)** 

In the heart of Mumbai, a middle- aged Maharashtrian housewife, endures her husband's chauvinism and the tedium of her relentless chores. She finds solace in her rich fantasies.



**Jewel,** Dir. Iris Abols 3' (Japan)



When COVID-19 struck in 2020, Alyssa – an Australian healthcare professional living in the UK with her partner – wanted to do everything she could to help. What happened next changed her outlook on life forever.



**Contradiction of Emptiness,** Dir. Irina Rubina 3' (Germany)

The language in which lullabies were sung to me kills. And I am with it. And the lullabies fall silent. An inner monologue between two languages and identities. Between the black and white of the pinscreen 'L'Alpine'.



Nothing we say can change what we've been through, Dir. Francesca de Bassa 3' (UK)

With an experimental visual journey, the film show the thoughts that the protagonist has in the timeframe between a question and an answer. How easy it is to communicate feelings?



Just One Pint, Dir. Lauren Hammersley 6' (UK)
'Just One Pint' is a short 2D narrative film following Haley, a 23
vearold

girl who uses alcohol to deal with the emotional trauma of a break-up from an abusive ex.



In Between, Dir. Ethar Baamer 4' (Saudi Arabia)

A young woman struggles to find her true self in this short animation. It begins in a realistic domestic sphere within Jeddah. Overwhelmed by societal expectations that dictate how she should look and who she should be, the central character responds by separating into multiple versions of herself, trying on different identities.



The Last Drop, Dir. Anna Tőkés 11' (Hungary)

Kata, is member of the national rhythmic gymnastics team that is exposed to extreme coaching techniques. The pressure on her is building, and the finals are near.



Welcome to sexy, Dir. Nina Hoffmann 4' (Germany)

While gossiping about their neighbor, a frustrated couple carelessly asks a question of the universe. When the universe answers, it has unexpected consequences...

The Man Who Loved Flowers, Dir. Sonu Thomas 3' (UK)

The life of a South Indian man whose love for flowers goes unnoticed.



Departing, Dir. Mary Martins 7' (UK)

Departing is a short experimental and animated documentary that reflects on the themes of migration, forced displacement of people and the removal of children. The stories are expressed through music, interviews and poetry, collaging a range of techniques; ink on 16mm film, scratch film and 2D hand-drawn animation.



It's OK, Dir. Rosy Turner 3' (UK)

Threaded, Dir. Naaman Azhari 5' (UK)



Dragfox, Dir. Lisa Ott 8'(UK)

Sam's search for identity gets interrupted by a mysterious neighbourhood fox. Together they embark on a magical journey to the attic to discover the surprising things they might have in common, and how to celebrate the ways in which they differ.

Hide and Seek, Dir. Director Junjie Xu 6'

"Hide and Seek" is a 3D animated short film that takes viewers on a bittersweet journey. It presents a story of a person hiding their queer identity from their parents at different stages of life. It highlights the struggles faced by the queer community as they grow up and explores the fantasy of queer spaces with queer phenomenology.

Grand Dandy (For Ezra), Dir. The Campbells 4'(UK)

Grand Dandy is a special film based on the poem "For Ezra" about the real life experience of non-binary author Libro Levi Bridgeman and their love letter to their grandson, Ezra. While it captures slices of their everyday life, it also explores the question, how to tell a child you are queer and non-binary? This film also highlights the importance that the common bond of any child with a queer relative is the same and endearing as any family.
