	<p>Check, Dir. Anita Gill 1' (United Kingdom)</p> <p>A short film about OCD checking and the anxious inner struggle that can often be invisible to others. The aim of Check is to convey this feeling of anxiety, urgency and frustration through beautiful, abstract visuals and looping, chaotic sounds.</p>
	<p>REST, Dir. Ryotaro Miyajima 5' (Japan)</p> <p>When immersed in the contours swelling and waning in the forest of needles, the mundane world drifts away, and we only live to breathe.</p>
	<p>Warp and Weft, Dir. Isolda Milenkovic 4' (United Kingdom)</p> <p>A love letter to the act of hand-making, traditional craft practices, and the people who love them. Stemming from the fear of these artforms slipping away in a society that no longer values the human labour behind them.</p>
	<p>Traces, Dir. Tilly Wallace 6' (United Kingdom)</p> <p>There is a photograph of a child left on the moon, a golf ball, flags, a lost glove. When the glamour of space exploration fades, what remains?</p>
	<p>Mini Horse, Dir. David Wischer 1' (United States)</p> <p>Composed of 230 Risograph-printed frames, Mini Horse transforms a video confessional from an online social strategy game into a fragmented portrait of competition, paranoia, and humor.</p>
	<p>Choo,choo,choo,choose, Dir. Xiaohan Sun 2' (China)</p> <p>A little girl is ignored by her mother during a long conversation with a neighbor, and in her desperation, she wonders if only her death would make them stop.</p>
	<p>Lights, Haze, Dir. Tata Managadze 8' (Georgia)</p> <p>Utopian symbolic playgrounds from memories are interconnected through sharp, flickering lights.</p>

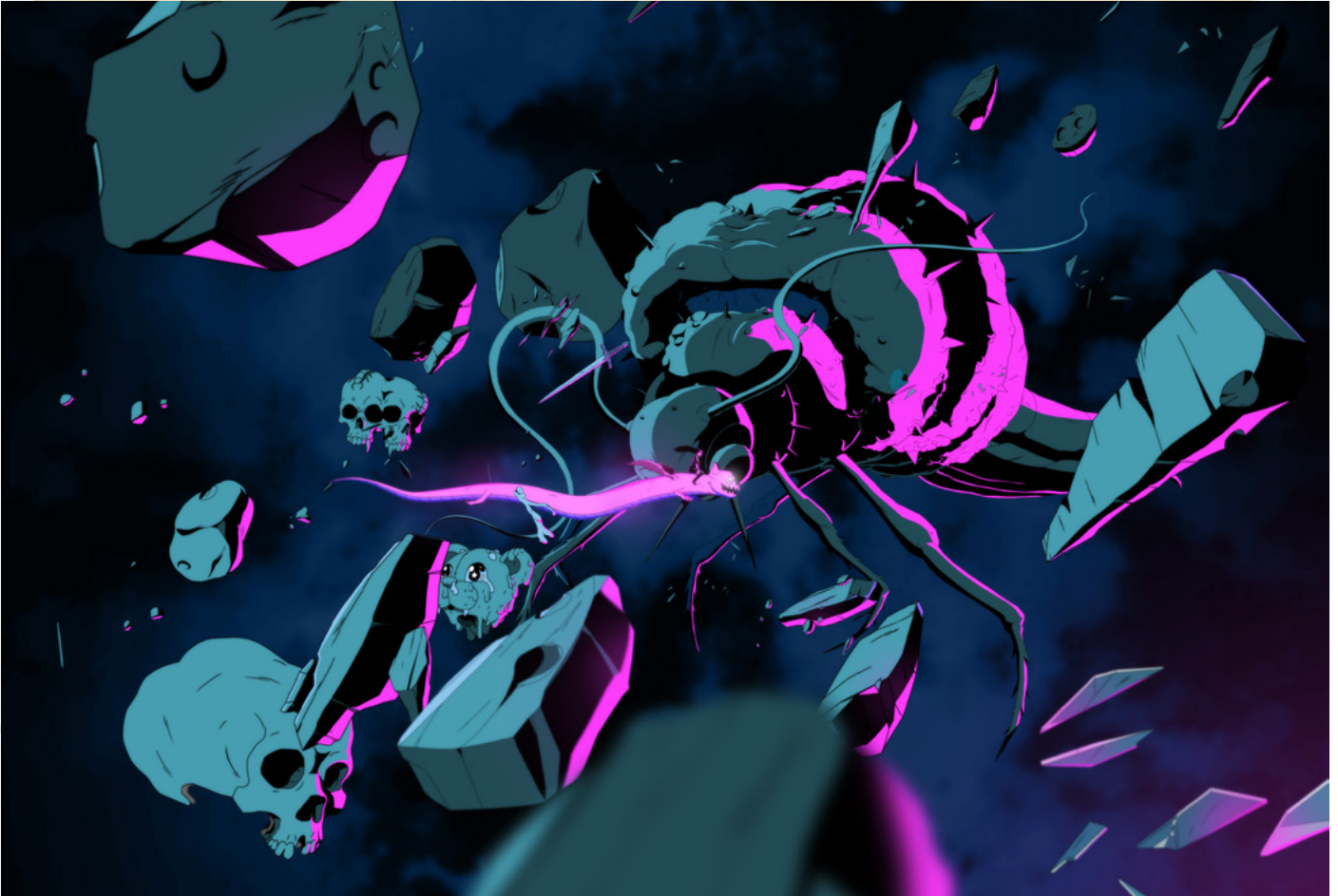

	<p>Opto Optics, Dir. Pearl Seemann 4' (Germany)</p> <p>A man enters a corner store trying to obtain ingredients for his dinner. On his way home, creatures follow him - even invading his food. They then invite him on a journey that takes him apart and reassembles him completely.</p>
	<p>1976: Search for Life, Dir. Tess Martin 11' (Netherlands)</p> <p>A new father visits the hometown of his mother in 1976, accompanied by his wife and baby. At the same time, the NASA Viking lander is sending the first images back to Earth from the surface of another planet.</p>
	<p>Endo, Dir. Eleanor Szydłowska 1' (United Kingdom)</p> <p>An abstract 3-ink risograph animation exploring endometriosis tissue acting as a parasite taking root in the body of its host. Produced as an ident for London International Animation Festival 2025's Abstract Showcase category.</p>
	<p>senses alight, Dir. Gülberk Elif Boşgelmez 2' (Turkey)</p> <p>"senses alight" is a short poetry animation about the shifting weight of existence. It explores the self as a canvas for inner senses.</p>
	<p>Tulipomania: Shines On, Dir. Cheryl Gelover & Tom Murray 3' (United States)</p> <p>A light from long ago shines on – a paean to ambiguity and endurance in this animation for music that inspired acclaimed author Jeff VanderMeer while creating Absolution, the highly anticipated addition to the best-selling Southern Reach series.</p>

A lone traveler finds enlightenment at the end of the road.



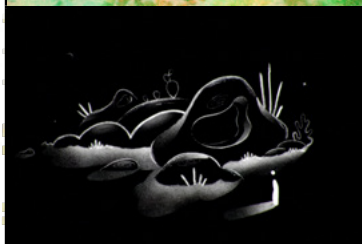

Funeral of the Earth, Dir. Jaewon Park 5' (United Kingdom)

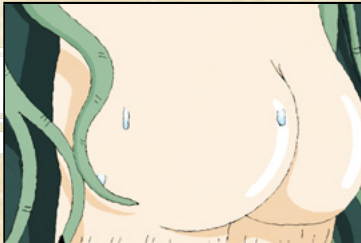

Sky Deverel - RUN, Dir. Michelle Brand 4' (Germany)

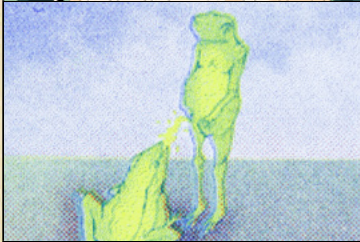

An experimental documentary that reveals facts and fantasies of the history of pregnancy tests from the 1930s-60s which relied on the use of live frogs and rabbits.



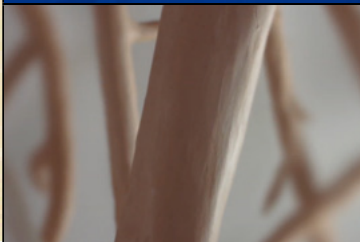
WildKind, Dir. John McDaid 7' (United Kingdom)

Before our very eyes a strange human-bird hybrid undergoes constant transformation to cope with the omnipresent tensions of economical, ideological, military, and climatic threats.



KT Tunstall - Cancerian (Official Video), Dir. Amy Lucas 3' (United Kingdom)

In the official video for "Cancerian," a previously unreleased track from KT Tunstall's debut-era archives, the singer enters a cosmic boxing ring to battle zodiac versions of her friends. Brought to life through vibrant, layered digital collage, the film is a punchy, playful explosion of astrology and imagination.

2pm - Puppet Stories

Puppet based stop frame animation was pioneered in the early twentieth century in the former eastern bloc countries including former Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia. We can still see the influence of these pioneers today in this selection of narrative based figurative films from countries including Mexico, Brazil, Armenia through to UK. Expect beautiful craft and tactile puppet making.

Yugen, Dir. Nayelli Ojeda 6' (Mexico)

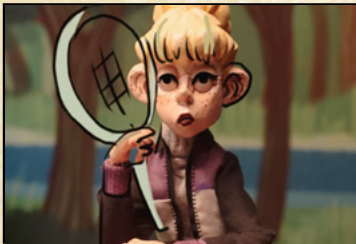

It will include new film *House of Love* which she was working on when she sadly passed away and was finished by her team, an extract of which was part of the 2024 AR exhibition.

Emma was part of the festival the last couple of years, winning Best UK film in 2023 for *Beware of Trains*, and participating in the AR exhibition in 2024. She always brought great energy, humour and discussion to every event she was part of, and of course brilliant work.

As well as developing her own career Emma was a massive figure in UK animation pioneering for change, notably working with the Animation Alliance.

This retrospective will showcase earlier works through to 'Not Daft' a piece on hearing loss she was also developing alongside *House of Love* when she passed away. Two people tune into each other across the noise of the world. When the signal fades, what remains?



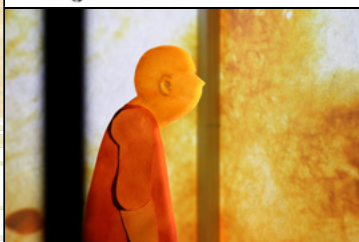
404 Page Not Found, Dir. Gina Kamensky 1' (United States)

Making It Fit, Dir. Mariana Leal 5' (United Kingdom)

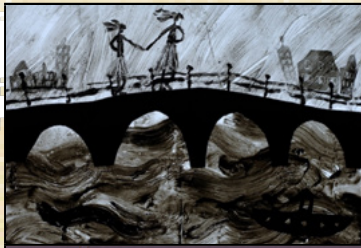
A short documentary film about how the LGBTQIA+ community has been reinventing funerary and remembrance rituals to better support and reflect the way people live in community.

6pm - Queer as F***k



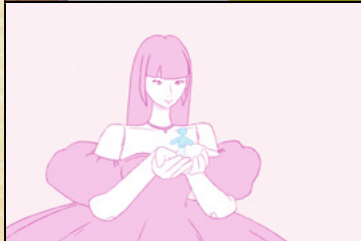
Mis-Angel, Dir. Wyatt Carson 5' (United Kingdom)

What begins as a typical, summer beach day: an afternoon of surf, sun and dinner, escalates into a theft and a riot. Why?



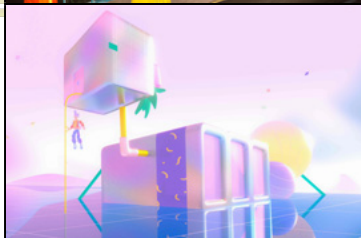
Air, Dir. Anna Firth 3' (United States)
